HISTORY - IN SEARCH OF OUR HERITAGE

FAMILY

This year, we commemorate the 200th anniversary of the birth of Count Ference

Szalvátor Zichy of Zich and Vásonkeő.



He was born on September 23, 1825, in Alsópél as the first child of Count László Zichy of Zich and Vásonkeő and Countess Mária Széchényi of Sárvár-Felsővidék.

At the age of 19, he fell in love with Emília Sárközy of Nádasd, the daughter of Deputy Lord Lieutenant Albert Sárközy. However, both families opposed their marriage, which strained his relationship with his mother.

His closest friend and confidant was Gusztáv Visolyi of Pap, who lived on the neighbouring estate in Gyönk. Gusztáv later married Ferenc's sister, Mária.

Heartbroken by his unfulfilled love, Ferenc travelled abroad extensively, often accompanied by his friend Gusztáv.

In 1848, Ferenc volunteered for military service in the Hungarian Revolutionary Army and died in or just before his first battle. His spirited horse – a gift from István Széchenyi – broke formation and charged straight into enemy lines, where a single bullet ended his young life.

He was buried with his weapon beside his younger brother Lajos, who had died of scarlet fever at the age of 11, in the crypt of the chapel in Pél.

COATS OF ARMS

The Zichy of Zich and Vásonkeő Coat of Arms:



The village of Zajk (or Szajk) in Zala County remains in the possession of the Count Zichy family to this day, as does the village of Zich in Somogy County, which is still held by the noble Zichy family of Zich. These two locations gave the Zichy family's founding ancestors their name.

The coat of arms features a blue shield with a pointed base. A silver Greek cross with equal arms rises in its centre, positioned between two stag antlers emerging from a three-pointed golden crown.

Above the shield sits a closed knight's helmet crowned with a count's golden coronet adorned with nine pearls. On top of the helmet, the same antiers and cross from the shield appear.

The mantling is gold and blue on both sides, and the shield is supported on either side by a golden stag standing upright on its hind legs, holding the shield with its front hooves.

ESTATES

The Zichy-Széchényi Estate of Alsópél

The Alsópél estate was leased to László Zichy by his father in 1824, shortly after his marriage to Mária Széchényi, with the intention of founding a family home there.

The local steward's house was considered ideal for conversion due to its elevated position and sweeping views. By incorporating a neighbouring sheepfold, they created a long, single-storey residence, bisected by a spacious central living room. The level difference between the two original buildings was bridged by a step (between the small salon and the bedroom).

The house in Pél was the first in the region to feature parquet flooring in its rooms.

The young couple designed much of their furniture themselves, combining the popular Biedermeier style with personal taste. Soon, the rooms were filled with generous cherrywood pieces, and striped curtains adorned the windows.

The garden was laid out based on ideas from István Széchenyi (Mária's uncle), inspired by the parks he had seen in England. He considered the varied, stream-cut landscape perfect for such a park.

The estate's chapel was also built during this period. Although the estate later fell into debt due to László Zichy's passion for horse racing, his daughter Mária Zichy revived it, transforming it into an idyllic "paradise" for all who lived there. The 25 years leading up to World War I are often referred to as the "golden age" of Alsópél.

At Christmas in 1948, the estate was permanently taken from the family – as were so many others across Hungary.

Tragically, the house eventually fell into ruin and was completely demolished. However, the chapel was restored by the family in 2012 and continues to preserve the memory of the ancestral estate to this

day.
